

Question 1 - Story 1

What is expected from you in the Classroom?











- Teacher display information (e.g. lecture) student absorb information (e.g. note taking)
- Teacher explain concepts students develop skills to understand these
- Student engage with learning activities teacher supports them (e.g Projects)



- A combination of
- 1) teacher explain concepts, e.g. lectures
- 2) student engage with learning activities, e.g. reading and writing assignments, research
 - 3) dialogue, e.g. seminars, Cases, Projects



3 approaches to learning

- Surface approach to learning: memorizing facts (e.g. 30 types of flowers) which may give an impression of understanding, but such knowledge can also be lost; low level of engagement in learning activities
- Deep approach to learning: higher level of engagement in learning activities. This include ability to memorise and paraphrase content as well as abilities to explain, apply and critically reflect on knowledge gained.
- Functional knowledge knowledge that can be used by the learner to inform action




What is expected from you in the Classroom? Put Simply,
